Thirteenth Report

OF THE ALBERTA BIRD RECORD COMMITTEE

APRIL 2021

Since publication of its Twelfth Report (Hudon et al. 2017), the Alberta Bird Record Committee, hereafter the Committee, considered 89 records of rare birds in the province spanning about 6 years of bird observations. With this review, the Official List of the Birds of Alberta grows by 8 species: Tundra Bean-Goose, Vaux's Swift, Broad-tailed Hummingbird, Western Gull, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Eastern Yellow Wagtail, Sagebrush Sparrow and Blue Grosbeak. Finally, we add Vaux's Swift to the List based on two sets of good photographs. That this is the Chaetura swift that occurs in Alberta has never really been in doubt, because the species breeds in British Columbia and south of the Canadian border in Montana, but we required undisputed physical evidence. We still hope for a recording of the birds' vocalizations to turn up. The provincial list now stands at 433 species, with the loss of one species (Thayer's Gull) to the Iceland Gull (Larus glaucoides) resulting from lumping of the two forms (see the complete list at https://royalalbertamuseum.ca/coll ections/life-sciences/ornithology/bi rds-list/taxonomy). The Committee now drops Anna's Hummingbird, Iceland Gull, Lewis's Woodpecker

and Red-headed Woodpecker from its review list.

Sadly, over the period of this report we lost our esteemed colleague and friend Brian Ritchie to a heart attack. Over his 20 years on the Committee, Brian always approached its work seriously and scientifically. He was meticulous in his adjudications, thoroughly researching each and every record sent his way, including considering vagrancy in adjacent jurisdictions. Richard Klauke has left the Committee, and we thank him for his many (over 20) years of service to the Committee. Caroline Lambert and David Scott have agreed to join the Committee.

The provincial list is also amended to bring it in line with the 58^{th} , 59^{th} ,

60th and 61st supplements to the AOS's "Check-list of North American Birds" (Chesser et al. 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020) which have appeared since publication of our Twelfth Report. These supplements included changes to the linear sequence of families in the

nine-primaried oscines, the genera in Rallidae, Accipitridae, Tyrannidae, Fringillidae and Icteridae, and the species in Phasianidae, Scolopacidae, Hirundinidae, Passerellidae, Anser, Anas, Charadrius, and Selasphorus resulting from new phylogenetic data. New information also resulted in the creation of two new families (Passerellidae, Icteriidae), the introduction of additional genera (Spatula, Mareca, Leiothlypis, Ammospiza, Centronyx, and Dryobates) from splits of existing genera, the lumping of Chen with Anser, changes in scientific names as a result of splits (Circus hudsonius, Lanius borealis, and Melanitta deglandi), and a change in the English name from Gray Jay to Canada Jay.

CORRIGENDUM

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CODE DEFINITIONS

ACCEPTED, CODE 1. Records supported by material evidence, i.e. specimens, identifiable body parts, identifiable photographs or sound recordings, whose origin from within the borders of Alberta is in no doubt, that are accompanied by written reports of the circumstances of the observation.

ACCEPTED, CODE 2. Sight records (without supporting material evidence) by multiple observers that are supported by independent written descriptions that leave no doubt as to the species identity. A Code 1 or 2 sighting must receive four favourable votes and no more than one dissenting vote to be accepted.

ACCEPTED, CODE 3. Sight records by one or more observers that are supported by a single written description that leaves no doubt as to species identity, and which receive five favourable votes and no dissenting vote. A Code 3 is the minimum for inclusion in the official provincial list.

ACCEPTED, CODE 4. Sight records by single observers that receive four favourable votes and no more than one dissenting vote. For record adjudication purposes, such a record is acceptable, but does not pass the more stringent requirements for inclusion on the official provincial list. A list of species that have no higher than a Code 4 record may be published as an appendix to the official list.

IDENTIFICATION NOT ESTABLISHED.

Records supported by material evidence or written descriptions that are not detailed enough to eliminate all other possibilities, or to support conclusively the identification of the species as presented. Placement in this category should in no way be interpreted as a reflection on the veracity of the observation, but should be looked upon as an encouragement to substantiate occurrence of the species in the province more fully.

ERROR IN IDENTIFICATION. Records where the documentation available to the committee runs counter to the stated identification, whether it identifies another species or not.

QUESTIONABLE ORIGIN. Records that concern species that are of questionable origin, possibly escapees, and whose wild status cannot be determined accurately.
